URBICIDE AND THE FATE OF CITIES: SARAJEVO AS A GLOBAL REFERENCE

CONCEPT

This panel is dedicated to the memory of Professor Michael Safier, whose engagement with Sarajevo during its most tragic period of urbicide profoundly shaped both his academic legacy and Sarajevo's urban recovery discourse. The session will examine the destruction of cities as complex cultural, political, and ethical events, with Sarajevo as a central reference in global urban studies. Special attention will be given to the destruction of libraries and urban institutions, cosmopolitanism under threat, and the challenges of post- conflict reconstruction.

The symbolic handover of Professor Safier's personal library to the National and University Library of Bosnia and Herzegovina — an institution whose destruction in 1992 marked the cultural dimension of urbicide — will be a gesture of knowledge restitution, solidarity, and legacy-building.

The panel will be held in hybrid format, enabling in-person participation as well as virtual attendance by an international audience of scholars, students, and professionals.

BACKGROUND

Sarajevo, as a city of deep cultural, religious, and ethnic pluralism, has historically embodied the European ideal of "unity in diversity." This pluralism has survived centuries of imperial rule, modern statehood, occupation, war, and recovery. In the late 20th century, Sarajevo became the site of one of the most intense urban destructions in modern European history — an urbicide in both material and symbolic terms.

While urbicide remains outside conventional legal frameworks, it is increasingly recognized in urban theory as the targeted destruction of the urban fabric, identity, and continuity. The long-term consequences of urbicide, and the paths of recovery that follow, demand new frameworks of planning, memory work, and resilience.

The work of Michael Safier, an urban planner and theorist, significantly contributed to the understanding of these issues. His time in Sarajevo during the war, and his sustained intellectual engagement with the city's fate, influenced global discussions on adversity-activated development, cultural trauma, and the ethics of reconstruction.
